Toys for Tots at CUMC




MISSION:

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Pastor's Pen

The Triangle of Fire

I once had an expert tell me that if you wanted to have an efficient fire you needed three components: heat, fuel and oxygen. Take away any one of the three and the fire goes out. That really stuck with me and when you really give it some thought you realize that the three components of fire dynamics are applicable to the success or failure of a company, organization or even a church.

To be clear, I am not suggesting we go out and buy some gas and torch the church. I'm speaking metaphorically. Let's think about church, our church, in terms of a fire. Is our church generating the kind of fire that draws people to its warmth? Is our fire smoldering and dying out due to a lack of oxygen, fresh air? Are we running low on fuel, is our fuel waterlogged and hard to ignite, does our fuel need splitting?

Look at heat as the component that attracts and warms people. Our message is the heat that is fed by the fuel and oxygen. Our message needs to burn brightly in a fashion that is genuine and relevant. The message you get from the pulpit needs to resonate with those who come to worship, those who are looking for answers to the complexities of life. The message we present must be one they can take home and apply to their lives. It must be a message that moves people to action and inspires good works. The message begins as soon as you pull into the parking lot and continues right up to the point when you leave to go home. Everyone can and should be a part of the message delivery process. Nothing gets the word out like talking about it.


As I was preparing for my eventual assignment many of the books I read said that missions was the way to build a church. I was, at first, skeptical and didn't really understand what they really meant by missions. I immediately thought about big and expensive mission trips to some far-away place in dire need of help. I now understand that missions is the oxygen that breathes new life into a church. The unchurched do not consider us relevant. They think we don't do anything, we just sit around and judge people. Good missions make us relevant. I now understand the importance of starting small and local and building momentum through excitement and engagement. Community does have a rich history of mission engagement so the cornerstone has been laid. Earlier this year, for example, the Administrative Council approved \$1,200.00 to be spent on three local missions. On a rotating basis, we send a monthly check to one of our three designated non-profits that is supplemented by members of the congregation. Additionally, at least three times a year I put our "Jesus Cup" on the coffee bar encouraging people to drop in their spare change so we can supplement our mission effort. This simple cup generates hundreds of dollars over the course of a year. As the spirit of giving has been kindled we find ourselves ready and willing to take on bigger missions like hurricane and fire relief. The result is that, with the infusion of oxygen, our congregation and the watching community realizes that we really are relevant and really are making a difference.

Fuel is what keeps us going. Fuel is our people. Some of our fuel may be smoldering or may be waterlogged. The burst of fresh air you get from missions dries them out causing the embers to flare up into a sustainable flame. New fuel, new people, are attracted by the heat we are generating and want to become a part of what is happening. The watching community will become curious and check us out. They will be attracted by the light and will want to warm themselves by our fire. They'll want to be a part of the triangle of fire that is making a difference.

So, there you have it, the triangle of a church fire. I challenge you to give serious thought about our fire and how brightly it is burning. What can you bring to the fire? Can you bring heat that helps get the message out? Can you bring the kind of fuel that ignites and burns brightly? Can you bring the oxygen, the fresh air, that breathes energy and excitement into the life of the church? Come, sit by the fire, and let's talk about it.

AN ECHHO MOMENT

As many of you know, ECHHO is about to celebrate our first 20 years. We were founded in 1997 to help elderly, low income and disabled persons of E. Jefferson County to live independently and with dignity in their own homes, regardless of faith, age, ability or income. Our volunteers help their neighbors by providing transportation to medical and other essential appointments, household chores and minor repairs, social support and medical equipment without cost.

In 20 years of service, we've helped over 8,000 individuals. Our volunteers have driven over 900,000 miles and contributed more than 70,000 hours of service. In 2017 to date, we have lent 1549 pieces of medical equipment! Our focus in the coming months is to increase the numbers and kinds of in-home services we offer to folks who live alone and have no family nearby. Monthly Devotional

Our Daily Bread, February 13, 2000

I will rejoice in the Lord, I will joy in the God of my salvation. —Habakkuk 3:18

Always Thankful

Perhaps Habakkuk 3:17-19 was an unusual Bible passage to read as our family and guests sat down to a traditional feast of turkey with all the trimmings. But I had a reason for choosing it. Simply to bow my head and give thanks didn't seem to be enough. Compared with the poverty of many of the world's people, I am wealthy.

The prophet Habakkuk was awaiting the destruction of his country by the ruthless Chaldeans, whose army was called by God to punish His people for their disobedient and evil ways (Hab. 1:5-6). He said, "Though the fig tree may not blossom, nor fruit be on the vines; though the labor of the olive may fail, and the fields yield no food; though the flock may be cut off from the fold, and there be no herd in the stalls—yet I will rejoice in the Lord" (3:17-18).

Those words made me stop and ask, "Am I thankful to God regardless of what He gives or withholds?" Habakkuk pondered how he would respond to the loss of every material blessing. He concluded, "I will joy in the God of my salvation" (v.18).

Circumstances may change, but God remains the same. That's always cause for thanksgiving.
