Another Commendable Local Mission

As you all know, I am always on the lookout for worthy missions in which we can engage. A couple of weeks ago I went to investigate a possibility right in our own backyard. I went over to the Old Alcohol Plant at 310 Hadlock Bay Road to check out Bayside Housing & Services. I had a very nice visit with Aislinn Palmer who is the Managing Director. Rather than go into a long explanation about who they are and how they operate I will let you check out their webpage at <u>baysidehousing.org</u> for more information.

Basically, they serve individuals who meet a "low income" criteria and are at a risk of homelessness, currently homeless, or are living in substandard conditions. They also focus on the underemployed/low-wage worker needing housing in order to retain their job and U.S. military veterans in need of assistance. In their first year of

operation they served a total of 29 individuals and helped 11 transition into stable housing so far. The shortest stay has been 27 days with the longest stay being 380 days. Of those accepted for assistance, 14 have been men and 15 have been women.

I asked Ms. Palmer what they needed and how our church could help them in their mission to serve the homeless, unemployed and underemployed. She said that their funding was pretty secure as they have non-profit partners such as OlyCAP and St. Vincent de Paul assisting them financially. She said they also



work with Jefferson Healthcare, Behavioral Health and Dove House in serving clients in crisis. She told me that they accept donations of clean items in good condition to help fulfill their mission of serving community members in need as they work toward self-sufficiency. She said that if anyone has anything they think might be of use to call her at 360-385-4637 or email her at <u>apalmer@baysidehousing.org</u> before bringing the items on-site. Sometimes they help source furniture for clients who have found housing, but do not have storage for these items. If you have items such as beds, bedding, tables and chairs, etc. feel free to contact them and they will advise if they have any clients who are moving out soon and looking for any of these items. As I have said from the pulpit many times, this is a busy little church with a lot going on. You only have to look at our bulletin insert on any given Sunday to get a snapshot of what's happening.

That being said, we have our joint picnic with Trinity United Methodist Church coming up very soon. We had a great picnic last year and if I remember correctly my head-count was around 67 people combined. I am very excited about our picnic for this year and have been working with retired pastor Dale Kelley, who many of you know, on a plan to provide free music after the picnic! She knows some women who play in two bands who have agreed to play for free if we make the concert a fundraiser for the Food Bank. As we actively support our local Food Bank I told her that would not be a problem. One of the stipulations was that we try and collect money



and food for pets as one of the band members works in a local veterinary clinic and sees a big need for pet food. I also confirmed this with Gladys Heinzinger, who has been involved with the food bank for many years, and she agreed providing pet food is always an issue as they cannot use cash



to buy pet food unless it is designated by the donor to be used as such. Also, people who receive assistance from the state cannot buy pet food with their food stamps. Those of us who have had or have pets know what an important part of our lives they can be and, I will admit, it never dawned on me that this was a problem.

In any event, I see this as a great opportunity to meet a need and get some additional

exposure for the Food Bank. The tentative plans are to start the concert in our outdoor chapel around one o'clock and to open it up to the public with some advertising. Admission will be free with a suggested donation to the Food Bank in either cash, non-perishable items and/or pet food.



The date of the picnic is Sunday, July 9th. We will have our service in the outdoor chapel with the picnic to follow. I will bring my gas grill and plan on cooking hotdogs. Bev Rothenborg and Jackie Dale approached me after church on Sunday and offered to help organize so be sure to contact them to let them know what you'd like to bring and how you can help. And, as always, this is a great opportunity for you to invite someone to church to check us out.

She provided me with an Ongoing Wish List:


- clean appliances in good working order such as minifridges (22 inches wide by 28 inches tall or smaller), microwaves (22 inches wide by 14 inches tall or smaller), televisions (modern/flat-screen type), electric kettles.
- toiletries like shampoo, conditioner, soap, toothpaste, toothbrushes and razors
- cleaning supplies
- kitchen items such as pots & pans, plates, glasses, silverware, utensils, Tupperware, paper towels, cooking staples (salt, pepper, sugar, spices, cooking oil, etc.) non-perishable food items, coffee and tea.

She said they are also in need of volunteers to help with gardening, minor construction, job counseling, skill sharing/teaching free classes, or in any other way that might be helpful to these clients.

Personally, I think this is an excellent mission opportunity for us to embrace. If you do have any of these items in good condition please consider donating. Also consider, the next time you are out shopping at Walmart or Costco adding one or more of these items to your list. Also, Goodwill usually has some of these items that are new.

Right now, there aren't any other churches actively supporting Bayside so if you do decide to donate make sure you tell them you are from CUMC. Additionally, I would love to see if we could get a couple of our Community members to volunteer and act as a liaison with them so we can provide immediate assistance whenever needed. So, please pray on this and let me know how you can help.


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

Bridges of Peace

In early July, when many Americans are preparing for our independence day, we also have the opportunity to remember Canada's independence day, July 1st.

In eastern North America, the United States and Canada are connected at many points by bridges. Some of these bridges are small, wooden structures; some are like the magnificent Ambassador Bridge that connects Detroit, Michigan, and Windsor, Ontario.
