# Pastor's Pen

As I continue to grow in my new career, issues pop up overnight like mushrooms that challenge me to address them in a clear and concise manner that makes sense to the inquiring minds. Recently, I've had three separate inquiries regarding exactly what a Methodist is or what does the Methodist church stand for. This may be a stretch, but I think these questions are being asked in other churches as well. We know people are out there seeking answers and spirituality as they visit one church after another. I know this based upon my last nine years here on the peninsula observing people visit the two Methodist churches I've attended. I think they're searching for a church that has meaning. A church with a core set of values and one that is relevant. This is where being a Methodist comes in handy as we do have a clearly defined set of core values. I have tried, over the last year, to refer to our Book of Discipline on some of the issues I have preached on such as suicide, homosexuality and addiction to name a few. This is important to many spirituality seekers as they are looking for openness and inclusiveness in a church. This is one of the strengths of the Methodist Church but it is also a great challenge as people are naturally inclined to pick sides when an issue arises. The seekers are also looking for a church that is relevant which can be a challenge as what is relevant is as diverse as the number of people looking for relevance. For us to be relevant I firmly believe we have to be actively involved in what is happening right outside our doors in our very own community. We have to be visible and engaged. Also, as Methodists, we are connected to all of the other Methodist churches all around the globe. A portion of your tithe eventually makes it into the larger pool that is used to not only run the bigger church but to meet the needs of less fortunate churches around the world. Through Methodist relief efforts inroads are being made to eradicate diseases, poverty and hunger. An accomplishment many non-denominational churches struggle to make as they don't have the connections for this extensive an outreach. So, in the future, if you think you're hearing more references to John Wesley and the Book of Discipline it's because there is a need to educate and remind ourselves of our Methodist heritage and our obligation to serve God's greater church which is worldwide.

Along those same lines, this begs the question of how we can be more of a force in our church, community and world. Tithing is very important as your contributions help us operate on a daily basis as we grow to be the church God desires us to be here in our community. Just as important is service. There are many positions and jobs within the church that need committed people to roll up their sleeves and serve. The Committee on Lay Leadership (Nominating Committee) met this month to look at what positions need to be filled. We also discussed the creation or reformation of some positions like Faith Formation, Mission and Service, and Hospitality. We are interested in knowing what you would like to study or discuss in developing your faith. Are you interested in any particular topics that would lend themselves to some small, short-term groups? We would like to see if we could get a person or persons to serve as a Mission Coordinator to not only help the mission projects we have but also look for other opportunities for us to impact as a church. I will say, based upon my observations, that we are pretty hospitable but I know we can do better. We think there are some things we could do better in greeting our visitors, exploring what it is they are looking for and how we can serve those needs without being intrusive. Remember what I said earlier, people are looking for a church and we may only get one opportunity to impress them so we have to be on top of our game. 

February: Food Bank \$125 August: Food Bank


