Devotional

Pastor's Pen

What do you think when you drive by a closed or abandoned church? Do you wonder what happened? Would you have liked the opportunity to ask them what it was they failed to do? Do you wonder if that will be us someday? I have no doubt that you may have asked yourself some of those questions when you learned Julia was retiring and the Bishop was going to send you a Certified Lay Minister. Are we circling the drain? Are they planning on closing the church? Are they going to combine us with Trinity? Maybe I better start looking for another church.

When I was introduced to the Staff-Parish Relations Committee by our Superintendent I was asked what my plans were. In short, I told them it was my desire not to be the last pastor of CUMC and to do whatever I could to work my way out of a job in three years by working with the leadership to get us to a point where a decision could be made on a long-term plan for growth and service. I'm not saying I'm leaving in three years. That's just a time table I set to keep me and the leadership focused. I've learned not to make long term plans because God finds them very funny.

In preparing for my eventual appointment I read many books and articles on the challenges of leading a church during a time of declining membership throughout the United States. Now that I am assigned to a church I continue my reading and studies with more of a focus on our church. Rev. Dale Kelley, who many of you know, loaned me a book entitled: Thrive, Spiritual Habits of Transforming Congregations. Interestingly enough, many of the examples given by the author come from small churches in Washington and Oregon. It is a very thought provoking book and it talks about how we react and adapt to the way we do things when we realize the old model may not be effective anymore. The author asks what we are doing to transform the world, our church and our community. Good question I thought. Well, right now, we are giving monthly to support the Food Bank, OlyCAP and ECHHO. We are allowing our facilities to be used by six different recovery groups for meetings. We've also partnered with the YMCA to host their ongoing program, Empowering Women for Wellness, with the county to use our space for their Strengthening Families program and the Jefferson County 4-H Council to use some of our space for a Leaders' Retreat. The Apostle Paul in his letter to the church in Corinth, 1 Corinthians 12: 5-11, tells the reader of the many gifts we are given by the Spirit for use in spreading the Gospel. We are to use these gifts to touch lives not currently affiliated with the church. We do it not expecting that these people will eventually join us. We do it because we strive to be a church that matters. A church with a purpose. A church that makes a difference. A church that is transformational.

Without question, Community United Methodist Church has done much for the community in the time it has been here and our desire for service is in our DNA. Hypothetically, if we were to start a new church, what would it look like? In what form would we exist and how would we get there? Obviously, we are not starting a new church, we are building upon a strong and solid foundation, but the question remains. In order to do this we need to engage in some very serious and concentrated prayer. We need to pray to the Holy Spirit for guidance. We need to explore what the Spirit is calling us to do next as we move into the future so that one day when someone drives by 130 Church Lane they don't see a boarded up church but one that continues to thrive and serve God's people in anyway it can.
