Eat More Eggs...

Do More Laundry...

out. We come to church to worship God through prayer and praise as we seek an ever-closer relationship with God. At the

same time, we seek direction and guidance on how to expand and spread the ministry of Jesus Christ. Through the guidance of the Holy Spirit we are led to discover new opportunities to reach out and serve the children of God who go unserved and remain mostly invisible to society.

A couple of our missionaries were recently down visiting the Quilcene Food Bank and inquiring what, in addition to money, they could use. Well, the director of the Quilcene Food Bank is quite creative in meeting the needs of their clientele, many of whom are living in tents and vehicles. She asked that we bring them empty (cardboard) egg cartons, dryer lint, small plastic water bottles and empty pill bottles. Yes, I did say dryer lint. What they do is that they take the dryer lint and put it in the egg cartons where the eggs sit and then cover the lint with paraffin which makes a very efficient fire starter. They use the small water bottles (8-ounce size) to put liquid soap and shampoo in that they buy in bulk. They take your used pill bottles and fill them with off-the-shelf aspirin and other pain relievers, vitamins and supplements that they buy in bulk. Now that is creative!

Our mission effort over the last 16 months has been nothing short of amazing for a church of our size. Each month we send money to the Tri-Area Food Bank, Ecumenical Christian Helping Hands Organization (ECHHO) and Olympic Community Action Program (OlyCAP) which is supplemented by individual members. We've supported Bayside Housing and Services with items their clients need as they transition to permanent housing. When the hurricanes hit last summer, we made hygiene kits that we sent to an UMCOR distribution center in Texas. We raised almost \$2,500.00 for hurricane relief and also raised over \$2,300.00 for the Central Washington fire relief. We've collected hundreds of dollars through our Jesus Cup averaging well over a hundred dollars a month that goes to supplement our relief efforts. Our United Methodist Women have created our own version of the hurricane hygiene kits that we distribute locally to the food banks and the homeless shelter. We will be sending a VIM (Volunteers In Mission) team to Okanogan County in May to work on a house as part of the Rebuild: Up From the Ashes program. This winter a team of volunteers made



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On behalf of your church leadership I am extremely pleased to announce that our plans to renovate the sanctuary and narthex are moving forward. All of this could not have been possible without the hard work and visioning of the Trustees, Administrative Council and the Finance Committee. We have hired and signed a contract with a local contractor and the remodel is scheduled to begin on Monday, May 14th! The remodel

will be in keeping with our country church feel being simple yet elegant. We will be covering the popcorn ceilings with a nice tongue and groove cedar planking. We'll have new lighting consisting of pendant school house lights and wall sconces. We will replace the older and boxy speakers with new, sleek, lower profile ones. The walls will get a fresh coat of paint with the addition of wainscoting along the walls. Because of the excellent financial stewardship of previous committees, the church has more



than enough funds on hands to pay for the remodel. With the new, fresh look, we will also want some new and tasteful furniture such as a pulpit, two chairs, a water table and a communion table to take the place of the existing alter, pulpit and two chairs. These new items of furniture can be purchased for under \$3,500.00



and it our desire that we offer the purchase of this furniture to the congregation. If you would like to make a donation to this effort please let me know or send a check directly to the church with a designation that it is for the new alter/pulpit furniture. If you are so inclined, you could purchase a piece in memory of a loved one. The current sanctuary, narthex and furniture has served the church well for many years but as we continue to grow and attract new members it is time to invest in the future.

As a result of our efforts to become more relevant in our community we have made the kind of contacts that have resulted in groups looking to us for meeting space. We currently have three Alcoholics Anonymous groups and an Al-Anon group meeting during the week. Beginning in May an Alzheimer's Support Group will hold monthly meetings at the church on the second Monday of each month from 10:30 a.m. to noon. On Wednesday evening, May 2nd, a group will be holding a parent's workshop from 5:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. where there will be a dinner and then a breakout session where parents can discuss issues in raising a family. We've entered into an agreement with the Head Start Program for them to use our facility during the summer. At the close of the school year their building in Port Townsend will be torn down in preparation for them moving into the newly constructed elementary school. They'll be using the kitchen to prepare breakfast and lunch for the kids and will be converting the nursery into a temporary classroom. Also, they will erect a temporary fenced playground at the far end of the building. While we are not in this to make money, we will be well-compensated and, hopefully, we can put this money back into the facilities for future expanded use.

To paraphrase a lyric from a 1986 hit by the band Timbuk3; Our future's so bright we gotta wear shades.

On Thursday April 5th the UMW had their monthly meeting starting with a tour of the Tri-Area Food Bank. Approximately 20 of us were shown through the areas starting where a recipient would enter, check in and make their way through the building to get various food items, starting with canned foods, one of a kind, dried beans, rice, fresh fruits and vegetables, meat and other items. After being shown how that process is done we were shown the very large outdoor refrigerator and freezer. The new freezer has been a huge time saver as all frozen items are in the same area rather than scattered throughout the area in small

freezers. We were also shown the large shed on the property which is a distribution area for large quantities for the four Jefferson County Food Banks.

Afterwards we met back at the church for a lunch provided by AJ Laverty, Sara Davis, Gerri Shaw and Janet Stevenson followed by a short business meeting.

Our next meeting will be on May 3rd and will be at the Old Alcohol Plant. We will meet in the lobby at 11am and have a short presentation by Aislinn Palmer of Bayside Housing. She will also give us a tour of this area. Afterwards we will meet back in the restaurant for lunch and a very short business meeting before adjourning. This will be a hands-on experience learning about another organization that our church is supporting. Please join us. Our annual hiatus is June and July. Our next meeting will be a potluck picnic at Port Ludlow in August. More info will be given at a later date.

Do not forsake the law of your mother. Proverbs 6:20

Mother's Laws

As I read Proverbs 6:20, which refers to "the law of your mother," I recall some of my mother's unique "laws" that have helped me many times.

The first one I call "the law of the warm kitchen." When we got home from school on a cold winter's day or when the holidays rolled around, the kitchen was always so warm from baking and cooking that the windows were steamed. It was also warm with a mother's love.

A second law I call "the law of a mother's perspective." When I would come to her all upset over some childish matter, she would often say, "Pay no attention." Or, "Ten years from now you'll have forgotten all about it." That helped me put things in perspective.

But above all was my mother's "law of faith." She had an unswerving trust in God that kept her strong and gentle amid the fears, pressures, and trying times that we faced as a family.

Mom has been with the Lord now for many years. Yet I'm still grateful for her "laws," because they have helped me through many difficult days.
