And on this day, we covenant to gratefully receive and actively engage with the expanded visions, the surprising experiences, and the new ideas you bring back..... We will be holding you in our prayers as you serve our sisters and brothers there. May our God protect and guide you. To God be the Praise and the Glory! Amen."

And, indeed ... "expanded visions, surprising experiences, new ideas and the friendship of new brothers and sisters" were all part of this amazing time in the beautiful Okanogan area of our wonderful Washington State – an area that had experienced some of the most devastating and wide-spread wildfires in our state's history!

The six hour drive from western Washington across the Columbia River found us among orchard groves, small towns and hills of high desert that began to show the telltale signs of the forest fire damage we would be working amongst for the next week in the mountains above Omak and Tonasket. We were assisted by a young Jesuit Volunteer, Aimee, who served with Barry Hansen, the UMCOR Reconstruction Manager who assigned our daily tasks for the properties of four wonderful folks during our week there – Kathy, Joe, John and Kathy, and Becky.

The first day dawned cloudy, damp, and chilly, as we traveled up into the mountains about an hour above Omak - first to Kathy's tiny but charming cabin, which miraculously survived the fire

itself, while the rest of the steep and ravened acreage was completely burned over. Don, Scott and John spent the drizzly day digging new fence posts and running barbed wire over several hundred yards of high hills and deep ravines. Not easy work for unaccustomed backs and muscles!

Teresa, Dale, Joan and Betty went a few miles higher to meet "Joe", an elderly

SODS. That's the new acronym for our church mission effort. Somebody Oughta Do Something. We are those somebodies. When the Spirit presents us with a need that requires attention, we are the somebodies that take action and do what we can to be the answer to someone's desperate prayers.

Jesus loves a good mission effort on behalf of his brothers and sisters. One of the traps we fall into is the belief that a mission has to be some large effort with many moving parts undertaken on a grand scale. While such missions are commendable,

most churches, like ours, do not have the resources or the people to accomplish such an endeavor. That's okay. Jesus has given us an example of smaller missions that might only involve our helping just one person or a small group of people. To understand what Jesus was talking about you need to read Matthew 25: 31-46 which I like to refer to as his "Least of These" sermon. In short, he's telling his disciples to be aware of their surroundings and that when they see someone in need, take action, do something, because, if you do, you are doing it for Him. Verses 34 - 40 pretty much says it all when Jesus says, Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.' Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you? The King will reply, 'I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me.'



Jesus is telling us to remember and include the individual in our mission efforts. I firmly believe that when we start small we don't miss as much and our mission effort grows as the excitement builds with the knowledge that we are making a difference. In July of this year our District will be renamed the Puget Sound Missional District. The Bishop wants an emphasis on our calling to be missionaries for Christ. We are already ahead of the game as

we continue to build upon the rich tradition and history Community United Methodist Church has in this area as countless people have gone before us into the mission field to help the least of these. Our missions can be as simple as collecting dryer lint to make fire starters for the homeless to taking a group of people in their sixties and seventies to an area devastated by a natural disaster to assist in cleaning up and rebuilding.

I've found nothing in the Gospels that say once a church has done so many missions you get to kick back and relax, or once you've gotten your "twenty-year" service pin you can retire and let somebody else do it. Our mission focus remains the same, but as we mature, some gifts or talents diminish but other opportunities to serve in the mission field arise. So, our mission for the coming year is to go to God in prayer and seek direction from the Holy Spirit as to where we are most needed and how best to use our God-given talents in His service. SODS!

Veteran, who lost everything in the fire. Joe had a newly built 24x24 home with a small deck that needed staining, but the rains made it impossible to stain, so we helped Joe assemble some furniture as well as clean some newly installed cabinets.

Day two found us at John and Kathy's newly constructed little home. This older couple had lost their four bedroom home, 39 vehicles, all their chickens and thought they'd lost their only horse who ran into the flames, but who returned unharmed two weeks later! The gals worked all day, completely scrubbing and cleaning the new home of all wall-board dust and grime, while the guys totally sanded two good sized decks, largely on hands and knees! John and Kathy had raised four children on this multi-arced site, and bravely decided to rebuild and begin again!

Days three, four and five were spent on 85 year old Becky's lovely property in the mountains above Tonasket's rising flood waters! Becky's tiny 20x20 cabin, was built with a tiny roof over her front door, angled so that snow would fall directly over her three front steps. Our task was to remove that roof and replace it with a 7x16 shed roof to cover a new deck to protect those steps (and Becky) from winter's six foot snows!

This was no easy task! But we accomplished it — almost! The roof was worked on by Scott, Don and John. After tedious removal of the old, and on with the new 2x8 roof joists, they added five 4x8 plywood boards, ready for the next teams to finish out. The deck frame is now in place after much measuring and squaring up, with half the deck boards in place, ready for the next teams to complete!

We returned to the church in town where Joan cooked all our dinner meals and finished our time of service with reflection on our wonderful week's experience and a brief Service of Communion before having our last meal together at a local restaurant.

We all took lots of pictures throughout our wonderful week! If "A picture is worth a thousand words", then there are thousands of "picture words" that will "flesh out our experiences" of trying to be the "hands and feet", the "hearts and love" of the God who called us to go and to serve our sisters and brothers in this place and at this time. We cherished this opportunity and hope to inspire others to go and serve in the future. I know that each of us is more than ready to pick up and to go again!

On Sunday, May 20th, I preached a sermon entitled, The Guiding Light, which was based upon John 15: 26-27, 16: 1-15, in which Jesus talks to his disciples about the coming time when he will send the Holy Spirit to them. Testament you read, the Holy Spirit is described as an Advocate, a Counselor, a Companion, and a Friend. Jesus tells them the Spirit of Truth will guide them into all the truth and will be speaking for him. Jesus is telling us that the Spirit will be a Guiding Light showing us the way and assisting us in doing God's will and his work here on earth. God chose Margaret to get this done and sent the Holy Spirit to guide and assist her. God chose a faithful servant who was confined to a wheelchair to be the moving force behind this project to provide housing to some of God's less fortunate. Margaret, with the guidance of the Spirit and help from her church, was able to clear these hurdles in her wheelchair and through sheer determination saw the project through to completion.

What a great testament to the Holy Spirit and how God can use anybody to accomplish his purpose. God does not see disability, he sees ability and provides you with all you need to succeed in meeting the needs of others. Thank you, Margaret for being an example to us that there is no job too small or too big that cannot be completed with the help of the Holy Spirit no matter what we think our limitations may be.

On May 13th, Diane Johnson, certified lay speaker and member of CUMC, subbed for Pastor Rosekrans. Her thesis was that the Sounds of Silence returned to cries of pain or cries to be heard CAN and often do result in the Sounds of Violence, or its opposite, the psychological or even physical death of the shunned. After the message, someone in the congregation requested that the words to the song be printed in the newsletter, as a reminder that we ALL crave, indeed need, to be heard, to be acknowledged...so let us do our best to listen....and hear....

Our Daily Bread, September 13, 2013

[Jehoshaphat] sought the God of his father, and walked in His commandments. 2 Chronicles 17:4

A Father To Follow

When I think of my father, I think of this saying: "He didn't tell me how to live; he lived, and he let me watch him do it." During my youth, I watched my dad walk with God. He participated in Sunday morning church services, taught an adult Biblestudy class, helped with counting the offering, and served as a deacon. Outside of church, he faithfully defended the gospel and read his Bible. I saw him express his love for the Lord through outward actions.

Asa, king of Judah, modeled devotion to God for a season in his life (2 Chron. 14:2). He removed the idols from his kingdom, restored the altar of the Lord, and led the people into a covenant with God (15:8-12). Asa's son Jehoshaphat carried on this legacy by seeking "the God of his father and walk[ing] in His commandments" (17:4). Jehoshaphat purged the land of idol worship (v.6) and sent out priests and Levites to teach God's law in all of the cities of Judah (vv.7-9).

Jehoshaphat's reign resembled that of his father; he faithfully honored Asa's godly example. Yet even more important, Jehoshaphat's "heart took delight in the ways of the Lord" (v.6). Today, if you're looking for a father to follow, remember your heavenly Father and take delight in His ways.
