## The History of Our Name

An old seminarian friend sent me a copy of the letter from President Kennedy to our church headquarters on the occasion of our uniting with the United Brethren. This got me thinking of the many changes in our name. When the Wesley brothers started their Holy Club they were creating small groups to exercise their faith every day. Some folks thought they were too methodical and began to call them Methodists in a derogatory way but the Wesleys latched onto the name and took the Methodist societies to the New World to pursue "holiness of heart and life".

When we separated from the Church of England after the revolutionary war we became the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Africans were a part of the MEC until the Civil War when the church split into the Methodist Protestant Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church South, the African Methodist Episcopal Church, and the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church.

In 1939 the Methodist Protestant Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church South became one church again, The Methodist Church.

In 1968 The Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren which had been formed by Philip Otterbein in 1784 from some Methodist societies, came together to form The United Methodist Church which we are today.



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#### Some Talk, We Do.

Over the years, I've spent countless hours in one meeting or another in many different capacities. Most of the meetings have been mind-numbingly boring as one person or another drones on and on with little ever getting decided or accomplished. I was at one of those meetings recently and no, it was not a church meeting. In any event, it is a group full of good intentions, but after a year it doesn't appear we have really gotten anywhere. When I'm in these meetings I jot down notes and observations. At this

meeting I jotted down: Some talk, we do. At the conclusion of the meeting, I took the opportunity to tell them all of the recent endeavors in which we've involved ourselves. I stressed that they were simple, inexpensive, and effective.




We've had a very productive year. We continue to support the Tri-Area Food Bank, Ecumenical Christian Helping Hands Organization (ECHHO) and Olympic Community Action (OlyCAP) Program with a rotating monthly check of no less that \$350.00, which many members of the congregation supplement. We now also support the Quilcene Food Bank funding it with our Jesus Cup spare change sending them an average of \$100.00 a month. At our



recent Administrative Council meeting we voted to send UMCOR (United Methodist Committee On Relief) a minimum monthly check of \$100.00 to assist them in disaster relief. This year we supported UMCOR on two occasions raising money for Puerto Rican hurricane relief and for the hurricane that hit the East Coast and the typhoon that devastated the Philippines. This past year (2018) we were \$1.52 short of raising and giving away \$15,000.00 to various charities and non-profits! This includes money we also raised for Heifer International, Toys For Tots, and Center Valley Animal Rescue. This doesn't even include the in-kind projects like making fire-starters, hygiene kits, scarves, and our

Socktober drive where we collected dozens of pairs of socks, hats, scarves and gloves. When you include what we raised in 2017, we've raised and given away over \$27,000.00 with right at \$3,000.00 actually coming out of the church budget. (See page 5 for more details on 2018 giving.)

Our guiding principle in deciding whether or not to take on a particular project or mission is whether or not we think it would be something Jesus would do, and I think the answer is yes. I can see Jesus dropping spare change in the Jesus Cup. I can see him cutting scarf material, putting lint in egg cartons and assembling hygiene kits for the last, the least and the lost. I can see him flipping burgers at a summer church picnic raising funds for missions. I can see Jesus looking at his budget and gladly cutting a check for a relief effort. I can see him coming to church on an early Sunday morning to hang out with other like-minded people who are striving to be his disciples for the transformation of the world. Some talk, Jesus loves a doer.










#### Thursday, February 7<sup>th</sup>

#### Love Finds A Way

Years ago I saw a cartoon that depicted a sour, disgruntled, elderly gentleman standing in rumpled pajamas and robe at his apartment door. He had just secured the door for the night with four locks, two deadbolts, and a chain latch. Later he noticed a small white envelope stuck beneath the door. On the envelope was a large sticker in the shape of a heart. It was a valentine. Love had found a way.

Only love can change a person's heart. The Russian author Dostoevsky, in his book *The Brothers Karamazov*, tells the story of a hardened cynic, Ivan, and his resistance to the love of God. On one occasion his brother Alyosha, a man of deep faith who was confounded by his brother's resistance, leans over and kisses Ivan. This simple act of love burned into Ivan's heart.

Perhaps you have a friend who is resisting God's love. Show His love to him or her, just as God showed love to us when He brought salvation into the world through Jesus. Shower upon others the kind of love described in 1 Corinthians 13—a love that is patient, kind, humble, and unselfish.

Authentic love is a gift from God that we can keep on giving.
