We also took a tour of the Wild Animal Sanctuary at Portage, located 40 miles south of Anchorage. We enjoyed spectacular scenery and weather, which gratefully lasted all week !

Our work consisted of replacing 6 major posts and the roof holding up an extended breezeway entry into the church, plus repairs in hallways, classrooms and doorways that needed spackling and repainting.

Our group consisted of Pastor Scott Rosekrans, John Sweet, Betty Prentice, Dale Kelley, Joan Flowers, and Don and Judy Olsen. The guys worked alongside several Alaskan church members replacing the breezeway posts and putting on a new roof. Dale and Betty did the inside repairing and painting. Meanwhile Joan and Judy prepared 3 wonderful meals a day for "all hands on deck"!

Saving Starfish

After a big storm a man went walking on the beach to survey the damage. Off in the distance he saw two children running back and forth from the beach down to the water and then back up the beach feverishly repeating the cycle. As he got closer, he could see that they were picking objects up and throwing them in the water. When he got to where they were, he saw that they were picking up starfish and throwing them back in the ocean. He asked them what they were doing, and they responded; "saving starfish." He told them there were just too many, the storm had been too great, and that they weren't making a difference, it didn't matter, to which they responded; "It matters to this one."

Somewhere in our community, our state, our country, our world a storm has hit, upsetting the lives of maybe just one person, their family, or a whole community. It may be a personal storm that has devastated that person's life or the lives of their loved ones or it could be some sort of natural disaster such as a fire, a flood, or a hurricane. The pieces have to be put back together but, due to the devastation, the pieces may be scattered all over the beach. Some pieces may be lost forever. That's where we as a church, as Christians, come in. Our job is to help others get off the beach. And that's what we do with our mission focus. Often times, it may seem like the storm has done irreparable damage and no-matter what we do, it won't make a difference, we must remember that our acts of human kindness and compassion make a difference in that one person's life, or with the help of other like-minded Christians in the lives of a devastated community or country.

Our community, like many communities in our wonderful country, have countless people whose lives have been upended by their own personal storm. They're hungry or homeless or unemployed and stranded on the beach. The money and volunteer hours we give to the food banks makes a difference. The individual bags of bean soup mix make a difference to that hungry person. The fire starters make a difference to those who live outdoors. The hygiene kits we've assembled and sent to Texas make a difference to those who just want to clean themselves up. The money we send to UMCOR (United Methodist Committee On Relief) and ECHHO (Ecumenical Christian Helping Hands Organization) and OlyCAP (Olympic Community Action Program) make a difference. Our many mini-missions are designed to generate interest and awareness in the individual plights of the least, the lost and the last and do make a difference to them even if it is just a pair of new socks.

Our efforts have not gone unnoticed as we have earned the reputation of being "that church" who helps those people. Your time, your talents and your tithes are very important to helping us be a shining light in the darkness and in truly spreading the love of Christ. We have a lot of work to do and there are so many storms with more on the horizon. My prayer, and your prayer, is that more people will take notice of the storms and go to the beach to make a difference because it does matter.

We have magic beans. And, no, we didn't trade our piano to get these magic beans. Like many churches, we actively support our local food banks with donations of food, cash, and other items. In doing so, we've stumbled into another opportunity to help the food bank serve their clients.

The food banks get a lot of beans in bulk, which is excellent. But the problem is that few of the clients want beans in bulk, especially if they live alone. Out of this problem of overabundance, we came up with a novel idea.

The food bank gives us their beans, and we make individual packets of beans for soup. We mix the several types of beans and add in a spice packet. Our local food co-op sells us the spices at cost. We include a bean soup recipe and instructions on how to cook them. We get together for bean soup-making parties, and our last two endeavors have produced over four hundred individual bags of soup.



We distribute our bags to three of the four food banks in Jefferson County, and they can't keep them on the shelves. I had an elderly couple in the office recently seeking some assistance. After we visited and addressed their financial issue, I offered them a bag of soup mix. His eyes lit up, and he exclaimed that he had gotten some at the food bank, and it sure was good.

What we've come to learn is that God will send your church the people and supplies necessary so you can meet the needs of God's neglected and underserved children so that you can give them this day their daily bread.

It's not what we think you need; it's what you know you need. We've discovered that if we ask the food banks and others what it is they need, they will gladly tell us. We bring the request back to our congregation and out of nowhere, the resources appear.

If you're looking for an extremely low-cost mission, this is it. Our out-of-pocket costs are the Zip-Lock bags, the spices and the paper for the recipe. What you receive in return is priceless.

See, the beans really are magical.

"The Faith We Sing"

Scott and I have been talking about the congregational singing. It was fun to hear you learn the August hymn of the month, a round, and sing it in two parts. <u>The Faith We Sing</u> has other songs with additional parts that are not very difficult.

If you have a favorite song you would like to share with others, please let me know. We could schedule it as a hymn of the month. In September, the hymn of the month will be a Methodist hymn by Charles Wesley, number 96. If you already know it, please sing out and lead the congregation as they learn it.

We have been discussing a time for anyone interested to rehearse, with the goal of enhancing the congregational singing. We would rehearse (1) a couple of new Christmas Carols in preparation for the Christmas season, (2) another communion setting that would eventually be used for communion, (3) the hymn of the month and (4) any unfamiliar hymn scheduled for use in a service. In addition, we could learn the extra parts from <u>The Faith We Sing</u>. These parts are not difficult and would add a fullness and lovely harmony to the songs. There are some music/singing details I would be interested in teaching as I think they would help the congregational singing.

We talked about doing this music rehearsal from 9:00 - 9:45 am on the Sundays I play, which are the 1st, 3rd and 5th Sundays. We realize this conflicts with the learning circle. A couple of possibilities we discussed were (1) people can choose between going to the learning circle or to the music rehearsal, or (2) alternate weeks between "learning" and "singing". The schedule would need to be adjusted a bit to match the weeks I am playing.

Most of all, we want to hear from you. Are you interested in a music group, learning songs to support the hymns and other service music? If you are, or even if you are not, what are your thoughts about scheduling?

Thank you very much. It's a privilege to provide music for your service. I grew up in a church with a lot of music and what you sing is very familiar to me.



Our Daily Bread, February 24th, 2019

How many are your works, Lord! In wisdom you made them all; the earth is full of your creatures. Psalm 104:24

My life often feels frenzied and hectic. I hurry from one appointment to the next, returning phone calls and checking items off my seemingly infinite to-do list while on my way. Out of sheer exhaustion one Sunday, I collapsed into the hammock in our backyard. My phone was inside, as were my children and husband. At first I planned to sit for just a moment or two, but in the undistracted stillness, I began to notice things that invited me to linger longer. I could hear the creak of the hammock swinging gently, the buzz of a bee in the nearby lavender, and the flap of a bird's wings overhead.
