The Clothes Closet Operational

March 2020

After much work, we have moved into our new clothes closet at the end of the administrative wing and are ready to continue our efforts of getting good, warm clothing to those who need it. We have a fresh coat of paint on the walls which makes it very inviting, tables to sort clothing on, shelving to display what we have, and ample room to hang all the donated coats and jackets to make it easier for folks to find something that meets their needs.

Initially, we started small but the outpouring of donations overwhelmed us and we couldn't keep up with the supply making it difficult to get the right clothes to the right people, hence the need for a bigger space. Now the question is how do we distribute the clothing and to whom? Right now, with those who drop into the church for help and the two food banks we seem to have outlets to which we can distribute the clothing. Additionally, I'll be contacting a few other entities to let them know what we have and to send people by. One question that has been asked is whether or not we will be open to the public on certain days between certain hours. My response has been to see how it goes and if there is a demand then we can see if we can get enough volunteers to staff it at scheduled times.

Right now it's been a real blessing to have this clothes closet for those who come in for assistance. At some point in my conversation with them I ask them if they need any clothing, like a coat, socks, hats or the like. They generally say then can use something so I take them shopping and they are free to pick out what they need. I also take the opportunity to offer blankets, hygiene kits, fire starters, and bean soup mix. All of which is gratefully appreciated and accepted.

We are only limited by our imagination and the Spirit has been hard at work coming up with creative ways in which we can meet the needs of God's suffering and wanting children here in our community. If you haven't seen the new clothes closet or mission work room come on by and I'll give you a tour. And for you bargain shoppers out

there, it's always nice to give someone something brand new, so if you see something on sale like a hoodie, sweat shirt or sweat pants, feel free to buy them and drop them off. Faithfully,

Pastor Scott has asked Rev. Dale Kelly, Janet Stevenson and myself to form a new Spiritual Growth Committee devoted to facilitating the needs and desires of the members of the CUMC congregation for deepening our relationships with God and Jesus Christ and learning more about how to discern the working of the Holy Spirit in our lives. We are excited about this opportunity and invite you all to participate in determining what will be most interesting and useful to you in your spiritual journey!

Our first action is to solicit your feedback in the form of a survey about your interests and possible spiritual growth activities that will be mailed to your home in early March. We will enclose a stamped addressed return envelope for your convenience. Please return your survey, even if you are not sure about what is entailed, or you would be unable or unavailable to participate in any programs at this time, but might be interested later.

Our next two actions are: 1) Rev. Dale Kelly is preparing a 4-5 hour retreat in preparation for Advent to be held on March 7; more information can be found elsewhere in this newsletter. 2) We are beginning a Prayer Chain immediately. For those of you who have never been part of a Prayer Chain, it is a ministry of intercessory prayer in which we lift up those who have requested prayer from our church to God, with assurance to the petitioner that they are being prayed for. When someone calls the church, the pastor notifies the first person in the chain, who calls the second, who calls the third, until the entire chain is praying for them. When there are 8 or more people, we will have a brief initial meeting to discuss expectations and set up the chain. If you are interested in participating, please notify a member of the committee.



No Better Time

I think there is no better time than right now to be a Christian. I know, that's a strange thing to say when it appears that we are so unpopular. We have an image problem and if we had a Public Relations Department they'd be fired and shown the door. I mean, how many times have you heard someone say they have a "problem" with organized religion or that they had a "bad experience" with church sometime in the past. Regardless as to whether or not such statements are true is not the point. The point is that we have a perception problem and that problem is our reality, whether we like it or not. I get that, and that's why I think we need a metamorphosis, a change.

We're coming up on Lent and Easter which is a time when we Christians around the world observe the birth of our church. Sunday, February 23rd, is Transfiguration Sunday where we celebrate Jesus' transfiguration where God was heard to say; *This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased: listen to him!* (Matthew 17: 1-9) God's church was about to experience a change, a metamorphosis, and things would never be the same. The new church was about to enter into a new covenant with a focus on being a church for the people, all people. And, if you know the Easter story, the existing church fought tooth and nail against any change, especially change that would upset their status quo. As hard as they fought, they couldn't stop the change, even with the crucifixion of Jesus Christ.

But here we are two thousand years later, and it appears we are due for another transfiguration of sorts. Merriam-Webster defines transfiguration as a change in form or appearances, a metamorphosis. To those who have a problem with organized religion or had that bad experience with church, they know just enough about us to form an opinion that we aren't what we are supposed to be and, that if we don't change, the end really is near. If Christ's church is going to survive as we know it, we are going to have to experience another transfiguration, a complete change of form or appearance into a more beautiful or spiritual state. We have to get back to the basics of understanding the Gospels and living them openly in our daily lives for all to see. If we return to that form of Christianity as John Wesley had envisioned what we offer the searching public will be beautiful and spiritual. The Methodist Church has conducted studies that tell us there are many people out there seeking spirituality, they just aren't looking to us for it. They are going elsewhere, and we can't really blame them if our perception is that we don't even come close to practicing what Jesus preached through our actions or, worse yet, our inaction.

I'm a "back-to-basics" kind of guy. In whatever I've done, I've identified the fundamentals of what was important to the mission of the organization, whether it was Little League Baseball, police work, or the practice of law, and I focused on those principles as the basic building blocks of the endeavor. That's why I firmly believe what we are doing here at Community United Methodist Church is so important. We are focusing on the basic fundamentals

of the Gospel of Jesus Christ in our message and how we interact with the community around us, and how we want to be perceived. I don't think we are doing church in a different way, I think we are doing church the way it should be done, in a true Wesleyan fashion, of which Jesus would approve and say; *This is my church, my beloved church, of which I am well pleased, so listen to them and see what they are doing in my name.*

So, if you agree now is the time for a transfiguration of the way we "do" church, then join me and the church leadership and let's make this the year we bring a change to our community that moves us and those around us into a more beautiful and spiritual state.

Lent is a time when we "journey with Jesus" through the desert for 40 days -It is a time of profound prayer, and a time to look deep within ourselves.




Lent offers us a time of grace in which God leads us, through the experience of our own "desert times" to the Hope brought by the Joy of Easter.

Bring What You Have

January 16, 2020

Monthly Devotion "Stone Soup," an old tale with many versions, tells of a starving man who comes to a village, but no one there can spare a crumb of food for him. He puts a stone and water in a pot over a fire. Intrigued, the villagers watch him as he begins to stir his "soup." Eventually, one brings a couple of potatoes to add to the mix; another has a few carrots. One person adds an onion, another a handful of barley. A farmer donates some milk. Eventually, the "stone soup" becomes a tasty chowder.

That tale illustrates the value of sharing, but it also reminds us to bring what we have, even when it seems to be insignificant. In John 6:1–14 we read of a boy who appears to be the only person in a huge crowd who thought about bringing some food. Christ's disciples had little use for the boy's sparse lunch of five loaves and two fishes. But when it was surrendered, Jesus increased it and fed thousands of hungry people!

I once heard someone say, "You don't have to feed the five thousand. You just have to bring your loaves and fishes." Just as Jesus took one person's meal and multiplied it far beyond anyone's expectations or imagination (v. 11), He'll accept our surrendered efforts, talents, and service. He just wants us to be willing to bring what we have to Him.

What have you been holding back from God? Why is it difficult to bring that area of your life to Him?
