A Gathering Place

"For where two or three are gathered in my name, I'm there with them." (Matthew 18: 20, CEB) Most of us are familiar with this statement made by Jesus, and it seems so obvious that we usually don't give it much thought. We usually think about it when we are all gathered for church on Sunday morning, or for an Easter or Christmas service, or for some church function where Christians gather. But what about those other times when we're gathered together?

Well, that did get me to thinking about those other times when at least two or three Christians gather together, and I immediately thought about our Clothes Closet and Food Pantry that is open every Saturday from ten to one that meets the needs of the less fortunate who live among us. On any given Saturday we have four or five volunteers who gather together in Jesus' name to minister to the least of Jesus' brothers and sisters. I like to pop in from time to time just to see what's going on and I marvel at the personal attention that our volunteers give to each individual client. They have previously taken the time to get to know them and listen to their stories, and these people who are invisible to most of society, respond to the kindness extended to them and open up even more as they build a new relationship with someone who is not there to judge them. Many times, these folks don't need anything on that particular visit, but they just want to stop in and say hello or give an update on their situation. Our disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world rejoice with them in their good news of a new home or a job and empathize with them over a setback regardless of how minor it may be. And I wonder if these folks can feel the presence of Jesus with them as their needs are attentively and lovingly met. I think maybe they do as some, on their way out the door, depart saying: "God bless you." I think this is maybe what Jesus meant in Matthew 5: 16 when he said: "In the same way, let your light shine before people, so they can see the good things you do and praise your Father who is in heaven." You just have to believe that when these people return to wherever they are staying, whether in a car, a tent, a tiny home, or camper trailer that they thank God for the few that are gathered in Jesus' name and for the light of his love that shines upon them with each visit. continued on page 2


KEEP MOVING

In case you haven't noticed, there is a chill in the air which means cooler and wetter weather is on the way. So, we have designated the month of October as OCTOBERRRR when we put out the call for warm clothing for those who come to shop at our General Store and Clothes Closet. As you know, we have been operating our clothes closet and food pantry out of the church for the past couple of years and have been open every Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. since January of 2021. In the month of August, we had 48 visits with an average of 12 people each Saturday. As a result of this mission, we have developed a pretty good knowledge of the needs of the folks who come to us for assistance, and you all have responded in kind.

Some of the items we are looking for as the weather turns cooler and wetter are sweatshirts in both hoodie and regular pull-over and zip up. Warm undergarments are also popular such as the 32 Heat clothing you see at Costco. Leggings are always in demand with our female clients. We're in good shape on socks but the heavier boot socks are popular. We're in good shape as far as hats and scarves go but warm gloves are in short supply. Our supply of blankets is low so warm and durable blankets would be appreciated. If you are wondering what size to get, just get the size you or a loved one would wear as our clients come in all shapes and sizes. Very gently used is what we are looking for but new is great. Remember, the quality of what you give us to hand out to our clients speaks volumes as to what you think, and we as a church think, about them.

And we also operate a food pantry and can always use nonperishable food items such as beef stews, canned meat, Spaghetti-O's, ravioli, chili, corned beef hash, Vienna sausages, potted meat, macaroni and cheese, and soups. You know, the stuff that tastes good and fills you up.

One of those positions is Treasurer. Quarterly you would pay our Worker Insurance and file a required report with the Internal Revenue Service. And, annually, you make sure our insurance, and property taxes are paid. You also prepare an Annual Report to the Conference and participate in the budgeting process.

Yean, I know, this may seem like a lot to do but you don't have to do it alone as we provide the support necessary to help get the job done and are always looking for ways to streamline the process to make it easier. And, should you make a mistake, nobody gets bent out of shape as we've yet to have a mistake that couldn't be rectified.

When We Gather Together

Hebrews 10:24

Denmark is among the happiest countries in the world, according to the World Happiness Report. The Danes weather their lengthy, dark winters by gathering with friends to share a warm drink or a gracious meal. The word they use for the feelings associated with those moments is *hygge* (hoo-gah). Hygge helps them offset the impact of enjoying less sunlight than their counterparts at lower latitudes. By circling around a simple table with loved ones, their hearts are nourished and rejuvenated.

The writer of Hebrews encourages this idea of gathering together as a community. He acknowledges that there will be difficult days—with challenges far more significant than the weather—requiring those who follow Christ to persevere in faith. Though Jesus has made certain our acceptance by God, through our faith in the Savior, we may struggle against shame or doubt or real opposition. By gathering together, we have the opportunity—the privilege—of encouraging one another through those moments in our faith. When we're sharing company, we're able to "spur one another on toward love and good deeds," which bolsters our faith (<u>Hebrews 10:24</u>).

Gathering with friends doesn't assure us of a ranking on a "happiness report." It is, however, something the Bible offers as a means to bear up in faith under the common frustrations of life. What a wonderful reason to seek out the community of a church! Or to open our homes—with an attitude of Danish simplicity—to nourish one another's hearts.
