He mentioned the remodeling of our kitchen, the conversion of our parsonage into two rental units, the tiny home village in our backyard, and our Saturday morning clothes closet/food pantry outreach. I was, as were those in attendance, pleased at the acknowledgment and affirmation of what we are doing as a church to share what we have with others in Jesus' name, you know, being "that" church.

The conversation took me back to May of 2016 when I was introduced to the Staff-Parish Relations Committee as your new pastor. The church, like so many other churches, was experiencing declining membership and attendance to the point where it was no longer feasible to support a fulltime ordained pastor. The solution was to find a Certified Lay Minister that was not nearly as financially burdensome. We had an interesting meeting. I was excited at the prospect of being a pastor and they needed a pastor in the worst way. (My goal was not to be a pastor in the worst way.) in any event, they told me the history of the church and the great mission work they had been involved with over the decades such as the cooperative relationship with OlyCAP that led to the creation of the South Seven Senior apartment complex known to us a Margaret's Village. They then asked me what ideas I had for the church regarding possible missions. Good question. I responded that as their former Drug Court prosecutor I knew that the Tri-Area was ground zero for addiction, unemployment, and homelessness. I told them that these livability issues were unaddressed by the current County Commissioners Court and that we should look at doing something about it. They seemed to like that answer so we negotiated an employment contract, and I was good to take the pulpit on the first Sunday in July of 2016. The title of my first sermon: The Enthusiastic Methodist.

Now I'll be real honest with you, my knowledge of leading a church is limited with most of my experience coming from the cheap seats on Sunday mornings. If I have any talent, it's in coming into an organization, sizing it up, and determining what it needs to accomplish its basic mission. I've honed this skill through my involvement in Little League Baseball, School Board, and being an elected prosecutor in two different states. Each one has a basic stated purpose, and the key is identifying that purpose and making sure that everything you do goes towards advancing that purpose. Anything else is superfluous and distracting.

However, there is one often overlooked dynamic when you are charged with leading a church. The Holy Spirit. Success, true success, in any church is dependent upon following the lead of the Holy Spirit. In John's gospel Jesus says in preparing his disciples for his departure: I have much more to say to you, but you can't handle it now. However, when the Spirit of Truth comes, he will guide you in all truth. He won't speak on his own, but will say whatever he hears and will proclaim to you what is to come. He will glorify me, because he will take what is mine and proclaim it to you. Everything that the Father has is mine. That's why I said that the Spirit takes what is mine and will proclaim it to you. Jesus sent us his Holy Spirit, the Spirit of Truth, to guide us and work right along side of us in all that we do in Jesus' name. The key is to listen to the Spirit and not get ahead of yourself. And I do firmly believe that we are truly a "Spirit-led" church as is evidenced by all of our mission-driven efforts that are focused on others and not ourselves, being the somebodies who do something in Jesus' name.

I look back on that May of 2016 meeting with the SPRC and chuckle at how naïve I was. I told them I would commit to three years to see what I could do to get them back to where they could, once again, afford an ordained pastor to lead them. Well, here I am part of the way into year seven and I'm discussing with the SPRC the feasibility of increasing my hours from 25 a week to 32. I'm not sure what the Spirit has up his sleeve, but I am confident it isn't anything we can't handle or accomplish. We just have to remember that with God nothing is impossible.

We recommend the "Basic Course in Lay Servant Ministry" as a great place to start. This course is also required as a first step for anyone seeking certification as a lay servant, lay speaker, or lay minister.

- Leads meetings for prayer, training, study, and discussion
- Conducts, or assists in conducting, services of worship, preaches the Word, or gives addresses
- Provides congregational and community leadership and fosters caring ministries
- Assists in the distribution of the elements of Holy Communion
- Teaches the Scriptures, doctrine, organization, and ministries of The United Methodist Church.

## **CERTIFIED LAY SPEAKER**

Serves by preaching the Word when requested by the pastor, district superintendent, or committee on Lay Servant Ministries, in accordance and compliance with ¶341.1.

### **CERTIFIED LAY MINISTER**

As part of a ministry team with supervision and support of a clergyperson:

- · Conducts public worship
- Cares for the congregation
- Develops new faith communities
- Preaches the Word
- Leads small groups
- Establishes outreach ministries
- Serves as a class leader
- Engages in specialized ministries after appropriate training such as in parish nursing and church planting
- Assists in program leadership

#### REQUIREMENTS FOR CERTIFICATION:

- Pastor and church council or charge conference recommendation
- Lay Servant Ministries BASIC course
- Lay Servant Ministries advanced course
- District committee on Lay Servant Ministries, or equivalent structure (See ¶668.3) approval

#### REQUIREMENTS FOR CERTIFICATION:

- Certified as a lay servant (or equivalent as defined by his or her central conference)
- Pastor and church council or charge conference recommendation
- Completion of a track of study as defined in ¶267.3.c.
- Conference committee on Lay Servant Ministries approval after interview with and recommendation from the district committee on Lay Servant Ministries

#### REQUIREMENTS FOR CERTIFICATION:

- Certified as a lay servant, lay missioner (or equivalent as defined by his or her central conference)
- Pastor and church council or charge conference recommendation
- Completion of a track of study as defined in ¶268
- District Superintendent recommendation
- Appropriate screening & assessment
- Conference committee on Lay Servant Ministries approval after interview with and recommendation from district committee on Ordained Ministry

#### REQUIREMENTS FOR RENEWAL:

- Annual report & renewal application
- Pastor and church council or charge conference recommendation
- Lay Servant Ministries advanced course in the last three years
- District committee on Lay Servant Ministries, or equivalent structure (See ¶668.3) approval





# A Hot Meal

Matthew 25:40

By Our Daily Bread

Barbecue chicken, green beans, spaghetti, rolls. On a cool day in October, at least fifty-four homeless people received this hot meal from a woman celebrating fifty-four years of life. The woman and her friends decided to forgo her usual birthday dinner in a restaurant, choosing instead to cook and serve meals to people on the streets of Chicago. On social media, she encouraged others to also perform a random act of kindness as a birthday gift.

This story reminds me of Jesus' words in Matthew 25: "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me" (v. 40). He said these words after declaring that His sheep will be invited into His eternal kingdom to receive their inheritance (v. 33). At that time, Jesus will acknowledge that they're the people who fed and clothed Him because of their genuine faith in Him (unlike the proud religious people who did not believe in Him; see 26:3–5). Although the "righteous" will question when they fed and clothed Jesus (v. 37), He will assure them that what they did for others was also done for Him (v. 40).

Feeding the hungry is just one way God helps us care for His people—showing our love for Him and relationship with Him. May He help us meet others' needs today.
