### All In the Family

For the last several weeks we've found ourselves in a sermon series out of the Apostle Paul's letter to the church in Rome. I'll admit it wasn't planned that way, it just sort of took on a life of its own as I followed the lectionary and ventured deeper into what Paul was trying to convey to a church that was experiencing doubts and a crisis of faith. The selected readings each week have woven, in my opinion, a story of where we were in our former sinful life to where we are now that we've been redeemed, and where we are eventually going when our time on earth is done. It's a story of faith, struggle, and perseverance. A story with a happy ending where we all live happily ever after, one big happy family.

On Sunday, July 23<sup>rd</sup>, I preached a sermon entitled: The Family Business referencing what the Apostle tells his readers about being adopted into the family of God as brothers and sisters and coheirs with Jesus Christ in the final inheritance. He says that if we are going to be a part of the family we will have to expect to suffer as Christ suffered for us. Now, I don't think he was talking about actually being physically crucified, although some early Christians were, but that we will face opposition and resistance in what we do in

Jesus' name. The question being: Are we up to the task, will we be the somebodies who do something in Jesus' name?

That got me thinking about a family business that I was familiar with in my past. In the early 1970s before I migrated to Texas to go to school, I worked on a family owned and operated golf course outside of Syracuse, New York. It was a large family, and everyone had their job to do. Mr. Forward, the father and grandfather, couldn't get around very well but his job was to hook one of the gang mowers to his Chevrolet Blazer and mow the fairways, all eighteen of them. Al, one of the son-in-laws, was the greenskeeper working hard to keep the greens in perfect condition. Mrs. Forward, the matriarch, kept the books. She was sweet but did not suffer fools. Norma and Caroline, the daughters, cooked, cleaned, and worked in the kitchen, and the teenaged children handled the menial tasks such as busing tables and waiting on restaurant customers. I was the bartender. Running a golf course is a very competitive business especially when large corporations got into the golfing game, especially in upstate New York where you could only golf in late Spring, Summer, and early Fall, weather permitting. Everything has to mesh just right to run a successful and profitable golf course and so many things can go wrong. Equipment breaks down, the special grass is susceptible to diseases, you can have both too much rain and not




And like today, Paul realized that the Roman Christians of his day were being pulled in many directions and having a hard time keeping it together. He was concerned that their Christianity was slipping down on their list of priorities, what was important to them, and their families now took precedence. How could he keep them engaged and focused on the Father's business? Now to be fair, it is difficult balancing work, a family, and God along with everything else that is going on in your life. Remember, the Apostle Paul was a bachelor and had a very special calling that he placed above all else. Nonetheless, he was genuinely concerned about faith and devotion to Christ taking a back seat to everything else and maybe even being put out on the side of the road.

And here we are, 2,000 or so years later still trying to figure out how to stay engaged and focused, how to keep Jesus in the car as we journey down life's highway. One could easily point out that we have many more things to distract us than the early Roman Christians had, and that is true, but God remains the one true constant. And that, I believe, is what the Apostle is talking about at the end of chapter eight when he says: We know that God works all things together for the good for the ones who love God, for those who are called according to his purpose. What this passage tells me is that God does love us, and it will all work out in the end if we just do our best to handle the tasks assigned us in the family business. God knows life is hard and challenging at best and that we have other obligations like supporting ourselves and our families. He just wants to make sure we have our priorities straight. To reinforce this the Apostle asks: Who will separate us from Christ's love? Will we be separated by trouble, or distress, or harassment, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword? He then answers his question stating: I'm convinced that nothing can separate us from God's love in Christ Jesus our Lord; not death or life, not angels or rulers, not present things or future things, not powers or height or depth, or any other thing that is created. As strong a statement you can make on the power and limitless depth of God's love.

And that's how it is in the family of God. Unlike the squabbles that we have had within our own families that have caused division and estrangement, there is nothing that can separate us from the love of God. No matter what happens, no matter how bad it may get, if you keep it all within the family of God, you can get through it, we can get through it, and be the adopted brothers and sisters of Jesus Christ as God always intended


What can you do, what can we do to keep it all in the family?



Saturday Soup Kitchen: Savior's Soup


\*\*New to the Soup Kitchen\*\*\*

Hard Boiled eggs—people love them and take them to go and eat later. We need volunteers to provide a dozen hard boiled eggs each week. Please sign up using the signup sheet in the Narthex.

Fresh fruit—they also love fresh fruit to take with them that is easy to carry and easy to eat, such as bananas and tangerines.

#### Sign up for fun, fellowship, and soup!

Each week it takes two people to handle the soup kitchen:



One person is needed to prepare the soup, set up the sanctuary, serve our guests, and clean up afterwards. A double batch usually does it especially if you use an extender like pasta or rice. Don't let the cost of buying ingredients slow you down, there are funds available to reimburse the costs of ingredients if requested.

We also need an extra set of hands to help with set-up, clean up and interacting or fellowshipping with our guests.

There is always plenty of bread and corn muffins, so you only need to provide a double batch of soup—maybe more, come in and set up, serve, and clean up when done.

We are finding that some people need gluten free and vegetarian options. You can coordinate with Lodema to help meet this need.

We have also discovered that hard boiled eggs are a BIG hit--especially to go--and they love fresh fruit such as bananas and tangerines. We need volunteers to make a dozen hard boiled eggs and

#### Discover Someone's Hidden Gifts




