



The following are the remarks made by Debra Dodd and Jean Holtz, sent as representatives of CUMC to meet our new Bishop, Bishop Cedric Bridgeforth. The meeting was held at the Redeemer Methodist Church in Kingston, WA on 10-9-23. Our Pastor, Scott was on vacation and could not attend.

Part I:

A Brief History of CUMC and our Tiny Home Village Peter's Place Debra Dodd:

The first two Methodist Churches in rural Jefferson County were built around 1890 in Chimacum and Hadlock. One pastor served both congregations. In 1959 those two small church buildings were sold and a 14-acre piece was purchased between the two communities. A new church was formed. The congregations combined to become Community United Methodist Church, as it remains today. We have always been a very community minded congregation. Pastor Scott Rosecrans has taken the "SODS" idea to a new level. (that's "Somebody Otta Do Something" and we're the Somebodies Who do Something in Jesus' Name)

In 2019, Community Church donated property for a tiny home village of 12 homes to be built on open land next to the church. Built by volunteers, these tiny homes house folks who otherwise would be living in their cars or tents. It's called Peter's Place after Peter Bonyun who was instrumental in making it happen.

The "about" statement on our FB page reads: There is joy at Community. We celebrate people, have fun and laugh. A lot. We see unexpected events as new opportunities to reach and embrace the least, the lost, and the last. We greet those unexpected surprises with delight and excitement as we go where the Spirit leads us.



Good morning Bishop Bridgeforth and our fellow Methodists.

Community United Methodist Church in Port Hadlock firmly believes in a ministry beyond the front door of our Church. This has been, and continues to be, demonstrated in CUMC'S long commitment to the following ministries:

- 1. A ministry to make and send warm blankets to the southern US borders in winter time.
- 2. A ministry of mixing and packaging dry soup mixes, complete with the needed spices, for our local food banks to distribute.
- 3. A ministry to make fire-starters for winter time use by our homeless campers. We also distribute these through the Food Banks.
- 4. A ministry aligning our Church with the local area immigration rights organizations to help immigrants find homes in our area.
- 5. A ministry forming partnerships with over 25 local Churches, agencies and organizations who, together, serve our local low-income and homeless neighbors.
- 6. A ministry embracing The Good Neighbor Program developed by the larger Methodist Church. TGNP hosted a summer picnic for our community neighbors. Neighbors and Church members enjoyed the picnic together

- 7. A ministry to start a CUMC based Clothes Closet just a few years back. This was, and still is a **totally "free"** Clothes Closet".
- 8. And one of our newest, ministries is our new CUMC General Store. We added to the Clothes Closet by including a food distribution room, a blankets and bedding area, and, a household items area. For those completely homeless persons in our area we have a Camping Gear area.

We are the only completely free store in the eastern part of Jefferson County. We have doubled our number of shoppers each year and we have had 650+ shopping visits since Jan.

9. Finally, just last year CUMC added a the ministry of a Soup Kitchen out of the Church. The Soup ministry opens concurrently with the General Store every Saturday morning & afternoon. The Soup Kitchen is called Savior's Soup. Folks can sit in the Narthex of the Church to have the soup or get a take-out container. Many CUMC members come and enjoy a bowl of soup and visit with our neighbors.

Life is not fair, and to be honest with you, it was never meant to be. As a police officer, attorney, and now as a pastor, I talk to people frequently about the unfairness of life. One of the books I hand out to people who ask me why bad things happen to good people is Why? written by Adam Hamilton. Essentially, Hamilton says that we live in an imperfect world with imperfect bodies and that we are often subjected to the exercise of free will that goes bad, whether it's our exercise of our own free will or the exercise of someone else's free will that either intentionally or unintentionally impacts us and the ones we love the most. Little comfort to someone who has lived a good life and has walked humble with God through his or her journey.

Let me give you an example. One of Teresa's cousins is truly one of the nicest human beings you would ever want to know. He has Alzheimer's Disease, and I can't see the justness in it. He grew up in Teresa's small town, married his high school sweetheart and raised two wonderful children. He was a high school teacher and coach. He ate right, didn't smoke, didn't drink, didn't do drugs, played golf religiously walking rather than riding in a cart, went to church faithfully, and never (that I know of) uttered an unkind word. He used to be able to dress himself and go where he wanted to go. Now he has Alzheimer's. He can't dress himself without help from his wife and she takes him by the hand wherever they go. How is that fair especially considering he led a life that brought honor to God?

I think about that a lot, especially now that I'm in my eighth decade and I see my contemporaries getting old and feeble right before my eyes. Every time I feel a new ache or pain or forget someone's name I wonder if this is the beginning of the downward slide. Teresa and I talk about it a lot, especially because we've seen both of our fathers go down that dark path leaving their wives behind. And as your pastor, I've seen many people I've grown close to go down that same path. Some go willingly while others fight it as they fear losing their independence and freedom. Many of our members have sold their homes and are now living in some sort of assisted living or perhaps with their kids. Many are thriving but others are not happy and even resentful. Why is this happening to them? How could their children do this to them? What do I tell them? What advice and comfort can I offer? What would Jesus do?

In the twenty-first chapter of John's gospel Jesus has such a conversation with one of his favorite disciples, Peter. After telling Peter three times to feed his sheep, his charge, he tells him about his death. In verses 18 and 19 Jesus says to Peter: I assure you that when you were younger you tied your own belt and walked around wherever you wanted. When you grow old, you will stretch out your hands and another will tie your belt and lead you where you don't want to go. John tells us that Jesus said this to show the kind of death by which Peter would glorify God. Jesus could have just as easily told Peter that because of his faithful service in establishing Christ's church he would live to a ripe old age with his loving wife at his side surrounded by dozens of adoring grandchildren. But he didn't. He didn't because the world is full of imperfect people who abuse their free will and we are gifted with imperfect bodies that can give out at any time whether mentally or physically, or both at the same time. In Peter's case, after faithfully serving God, he was led to a Roman cross and crucified just as his Lord and Savior only he insisted upon being hung on the cross upside down as he didn't feel worthy of being crucified in the same manner as his King.

Even as believers we may be uncertain and fearful about our future here on earth, not the one we know about in eternity, but the day-to-day struggle to get by as best we can. But if we know God is in control, we can confidently follow Christ even if we can no longer safely do for our selves and are led to places we'd rather not go. We do it because we have tried our best to lead a life that has brought glory to God, a life well lived where we walked humbly with our God, and nobody can take that from us no matter where we spend our remaining days.
