A Repurposed Life

Old pianos and used coffee pots. Every church that's been in one place for any length of time has them. When I got here over seven years ago, we were no different and had more than our fair share of both. We had all of these Mr. Coffee coffee makers that had been donated to the church long after they stopped making a full pot of coffee in under fifteen minutes at home. And the same holds true for pianos. We had several. There was one in the hallway leading from the narthex to the administrative wing, there was one in the music room, one in the parsonage, and another tucked into a corner in the old sanctuary. We are currently down to two pianos, and it is a challenge to stay at just two as every once in a while, I get a call from someone wanting to donate a piano. I sympathize with them and politely decline their cherished instrument.

But this is a story about the piano we couldn't give away. It's the old Everett piano that was down in the old sanctuary. Our best offer was from a guy who said he would charge us \$500.00 to haul it off. I don't know the background on this magnificent old piano, but my research told me that these pianos were made by the Everett Piano Company of Boston, Massachusetts in the 1890s. They were very popular and well built. I suspect that this

piano came from either the Methodist Church in Chimacum or the one in Port Hadlock that were both established between 1900 and 1915, give or take a few years. Both churches were consolidated into our present church around 1960 and our piano made a shorter trip to its present location. Well, it got to the point it was taking up valuable space in our mission room and something had to be done. Not wanting to pay \$500.00 to have it hauled away, a decision was made to dismantle it ourselves and haul it off. It was about that time I came up with the idea to make a desk for the pastor out of it. I approached Don Olsen, told him no was an appropriate answer, and asked him what he thought about making it into a desk. Don didn't hesitate and agreed to give it a try. The good thing about repurposing something you were about to throw away is that there is no real downside. All you're really out is your time. Don got to it and the project started taking shape with the removal of the piano string apparatus and the keyboard. As he encountered obstacles Don came up with creative solutions. He figured out a way to make two drawers out of the keyboard cover and he put in an undermount power strip complete with lighting. Then it was my turn to get involved. I gave the old piano a light sanding wanting to take off the layers of polish and still keep the original finish. I put two coats of matching stain and polyurethane on it which restored its finish. My goal was not to make it look new, but to show that it had aged with beauty. And now the piano resides

in my office enjoying its repurposed life as a desk for the pastor and connecting us to our past.

But the real story is not in the life given to a repurposed piano. The real story is in that with Jesus' help and the guidance of the Holy Spirit we too can experience a repurposed life in service to God. For example, I started out as a police officer and then moved on to becoming a lawyer. When I got voted out of office at age 61, I figured I was done. I had no desire to open up another law practice. But God repurposed my life and had me assigned as a shepherd to his flock out on the Olympic Peninsula. What God has shown me is that life doesn't end at sixty, or seventy, or eighty, or even ninety. Our lives have purpose and meaning and although we can't do what we once did, if we turn our lives over to God, He can repurpose us giving us new life full of meaning as we seek to do His will and His way. Won't you allow God to step in and do a little repurposing in your life? It might just surprise you what more you can do.






Hospitality:

Soups On! Saturday Soup Kitchen: Savior's Soup



I want to express my sincerest Thank You to all of the volunteers who have signed up for September and October. All dates are filled except for <u>Saturday October 7th</u>. I need volunteers who is already familiar with the process because that is the only day next month that I (Lori) will not be able to assist, guide and coach a new volunteer. Please help!

One person is needed to prepare the soup, set up the sanctuary, serve our guests, and clean up afterwards. A double batch usually does it especially if you use an extender like pasta or rice. Don't let the cost of buying ingredients slow you down, there are funds available to reimburse the costs of ingredients if requested.

We also need an extra set of hands to help with set-up, clean up and interacting or fellowshipping with our guests.

There is always plenty of bread and corn muffins, so you only need to provide a double batch of soup—maybe more, come in and set up, serve, and clean up when done.

We have also discovered that hard boiled eggs are a BIG hit--especially to go--and they love fresh fruit such as bananas and tangerines. We need volunteers to make a dozen hard boiled eggs. And provide fresh fruit for each week. The How to get involved:

Make a dozen hard boiled eggs.


Provide fresh fruit.

Socktober 2023

If you've been around for the last few years, you know what month is approaching. No, not October, but "Socktober"! Yes, for those who do not know, Community United Methodist Church designates the month of October as Socktober month where we accept donations of warm and water-resistant clothing. Socks are the number one item requested at homeless shelters and our General Store is no exception. This time of the year those warm boot socks are in especially high demand.

So, think warm. If it gets cold, we want to keep it warm. We need donations of either gently worn or new items such as socks, gloves, hats, hoodies, sweatshirts, sweatpants, jeans, coats and jackets, boots and water-resistant shoes, rain ponchos, and other similar items. Because they are considered underwear, we prefer new thermal undergarments like the 32 heat long sleeve undershirts and other "long john" clothing. Our tiny home neighbors also like warm robes, pajamas, and slippers. So, go to your coat closet and see if you can spare any of those nice coats you haven't worn in a while along with those extra hats, gloves and scarves. Then check your closets and drawers for any of those warm items that you may have outgrown since last year. And, if you are of a mind to, new is always appreciated by our shoppers. Remember, the quality of what you give us to share with our neighbors speaks volumes as to what we really think about them. So please, no dirty, stained, ripped, torn, broken zippers, or missing button clothing.

Not sure what size to get? Well, our clientele comes in all shapes, sizes, and ages. Buy the size you would wear or if your kids or grandkids needed clothing. Sadly, we are seeing more parents coming in with their kids also needing clothing. That being said, check with your grandkids, tell them what you need, and use it as a teachable moment where they too can be a part of the solution. The following list is a brief rundown of the various community programs and organizations with which the CUMC General Store has formed working partnerships. As a growing service we know that CUMC and the CUMC Store cannot eradicate hunger and the clothing needs of our community on our own. We intended from the beginning to seek out community partnerships to collectively address and serve the growing homelessness and hunger. Note that we do not use the terms: "unsheltered" or "food insecure". Those terms seek to make more acceptable problems we have not yet solved. There are human beings who continue to exist and who live on the streets, out in our wooded areas or in rundown vehicles. They are homeless. They are hungry. The CUMC Store relies on and seeks to be a support to many of the community groups seeking to serve others in need.

- American Red Cross: CUMC recently renewed its partnership with the local American Red Cross and we are once again a Disaster Shelter when emergencies hit the Tri-Area.
- Bayside Housing Services: We help support the individuals housed in the various Bayside programs. Residents come over and shop at our store for food, clothes, shoes, bedding, household items and camping gear.
- Better Living Center Seventh Day Adventist Church, Port Townsend: This thrift store is run by the Seventh Day Adventist Church in Port Townsend. When our store has an abundance of clothes we take some to this store.
- Caswell-Brown Homeless Encampment: Folks living in CB come over to our Store to shop. We also have two CUMC liaisons to the Camp who pick up food, clothing and other items and take them to the Camp. There are those people at C-B who are too frightened, too embarrassed or simply lack any transportation to come to u. We are thankful that we have trusted people who can take food and items to them.
- Chimacum High School: We are pleased to let you know that this year we have been added to the "Community Service Opportunities" for High School seniors looking for a place to do their Community Service to complete their graduation requirements.
- Discovery Shop/American Cancer Society: Marsha treks down to this great store in Silverdale when, again, we have an abundance of clothes to share with them. The Discovery Shop also brings us household items that they receive in their shop. And if something takes you to Silverdale, do stop at this shop. They have some nice things at great prices and proceeds help support the American Cancer Society.
- Fancy Feathers Clothing Shop: Marsha, from our Store, takes some of "the finer items" that come into the store and FF sells them on consignment for us. Marsha has raised over \$200.00 so far. We use the money to buy the shoes, boots & jeans that go the fastest in our Store.
- Food Banks: Tri-Area & Quilcene: CUMC, as a Church, has long supported these two local Food Banks. Both Bank send shoppers to our store and occasionally share their abundance with our store.
- Foster Support of Jefferson County: Fosters families from this program are welcome to come shop at the Store. Sometimes their volunteers pick up goods (like diapers) from our Store.
- Grace Christian Church: This Church in Port Ludlow that that has sent us support money. There are also a couple of members of this Church who bring "loose change" to our Jesus Cup.
- Humane Society of Jefferson County: This year CUMC formed a partnership with the Humane Society of Jefferson County. The HSJC has twice now given us dog and cat food for our store. Later this year we plan to do a pet vaccinations clinic with the HSJC at our store.
- JCIRA: Larry & Diane Jensen belong to this immigrant rights organization and JCIRA has sent us two immigrant families who needed clothing, bedding and household items to help them settle into their new lives in the U.S.
- Kiwanis of Port Townsend: The Kiwanis club has added CUMC to their quarterly donation groups to support our Mission efforts.
- OlyCap: Well, we have a few different ways we work with OlyCap. OC leases the land for Margaret's Village....low income apartments for seniors. Recently, OC has subsidized the rental of the bottom part of our

Parsonage.

- Olympic Angels: This is another Foster Care Support organization. We support OA the same way we do the Foster Support of JeffCo.
- Pat's Place (PT) & Peter's Place (PH): Residents from these two Tiny House Villages come and shop at the CUMC Store for food, clothes, shoes, bedding, and small household items.
- Peace Lutheran Church: This Port Ludlow based church has, since the beginning of the Store, supported us with volunteers who work side by side with us every Saturday. Jean Schubert from Peace Lutheran has been a volunteer at our Store for two years now and heads up our Children's Clothing Dept. Jean has brought us a "donation check" to support the Store with \$\$\$\$. Jean S. has also asked her congregation for children's clothes and ran a children's "undie drive" there with enthusiastic support from the people of this church.
- Presbyterian Church of Port Townsend: This is another Church that graciously sent us a check to support what we are doing at the Store.
- Redeemer Lutheran Church: A Port Hadlock Church that has also supported our Store from the beginning. They keep us supplied with beautiful handmade quilts that fit the beds at Peter's and Pat's Places. They keep us supplied in quilts. Karen is a 93-year-old female member of Redeemer who bakes small loaves of bread every other week for our Store. She also makes beautiful pillowcases for kids. We all want to grow up to be like this woman!
- St. Vincent de Paul: Through CUMC's assistance, the St. Vincent de Paul Society now comes to Peter's Place weekly to provide the residents with vouchers that can be used at our local laundromat.
- Sunrise Rotary Club of PT: SRC recently provided the CUMC with a \$500.00 Community Grant with which we purchased 25 solar lamps for homeless folks camping out or who are sleeping in their cars or RV's.
- VetConnect: VC is an OlyCap program in Port Hadlock which serves military Veterans in our community. They send over to our Store any Vet who needs food, clothing, bedding or household items.
- The Victorian Clipper Barber Shop: Debbie Hinton, owner of the Clipper, maintains a coin donation jar at her counter. Debbie has given Scott, our Pastor, jars of change to support our Missions. Debbie has also given us additional donations on a few occasions.
- YMCA Program: The CUMC Store has recently struck up a partnership with the Hot Shower Program at the YMCA in PT. We have, four times now, provided this program with bath towels, wash cloths, soap, shampoo, conditioner and razors. The homeless folks in the area can come in for a hot shower and a chance to clean up.

I want to add a note to acknowledge the individual support persons who staff the Store on Saturdays and often, during the week. The CUMC Store volunteers are Marsha Hamacher, Sue French, Jean Schubert, Debbie Dodd, Ari Carter-Douglas, Anne Chapman, Connie Ross and Pat Chase. Our volunteers spend endless hours sorting through every item of clothing, shoes and household items coming to our Store to make sure they are clean, not stained or ripped and that buttons and zippers are working. Laurel Ankeny also helps us sort clothes occasionally and supports the Store in many other ways. The General Store could not function without the very hard work these individuals contribute to CUMC. We are blessed with the wonderful leadership and positive support in so many ways, from our Pastor, Scott Rosekranz!



God's Open Table

I love birds, and I feed them at multiple locations. They are amazing creations of God, and I enjoy hearing and seeing them.

They also remind me of Jesus' love and care as scripture affirms.

My feeding areas attract many different birds: colorful cardinals, perky wrens, cute chickadees, assertive mockingbirds. All these diverse species eat together, though they don't always get along. I am happy they enjoy their food side by side.

This reminds me of the parable Jesus shared with the chief priests and elders in Jerusalem shortly before his death and resurrection. His story of the king who prepared a wedding feast for his son and filled the banquet hall with all types of people is an example of how God loves us and delights in our presence, regardless of race, gender, creed or other differences. In fact, the king sent his servants throughout the town to ensure that all were invited.
