Hope Happens Here

Earlier in November we had our annual Charge Conference which, in my opinion, was a thing of beauty. We held it at 11:00 a.m. on a Saturday when the General Store and Soup Kitchen were up and running. It gave our District Superintendent Mark Galang an opportunity to see us doing church as we do it best, meeting the needs of our neighbors who come to us for the necessities of life. In his remarks, Mark said he was reminded of what his grandmother said to him a long time ago when talking about her concept of church: "Hope Happens Here." While I was meeting with the Staff-Parish Relations Committee he wandered around the church visiting the clothes closet talking with a few of our volunteers as they went about their business and then he went up to the soup kitchen and observed soup being served to our neighbors as they sat and enjoyed their meal. He remarked that he holds us up as an example to other small churches of what can happen when you let the Spirit lead you where you are needed. It was very reaffirming and validating as he acknowledged that hope happens here at Community.

Hope Happens Here. That phrase really resonated with me to the point that it might be one of our mission statements taking its place right along SODS (Somebody Oughta Do Something). Hope does happen here for the countless people who show up on Saturday morning hoping to find some warm clothes, a blanket, a sleeping bag, new socks, waterproof boots, and other items you and I take for granted. They come looking for some food to help them get through the week because the price of gro-

ceries is still too high. And they come to be acknowledged and recognized by our volunteers, our disciples, who greet them warmly and serve them with dignity and empathy. They like us because we genuinely like them. They come for the soup and fellowship. They are met by a friendly face who offers them a bowl of soup with an offer of seconds and a bowl to go. We know their names. We let them hang out for as long as they want. This is their safe place. This is where hope happens because they are made to feel welcomed and they get to experience the love of Jesus Christ whether they realize it or not.

But the hope that happens here is not just for those who come on Saturday, the hope is here for those of us who make up the congregation, those who also need to be seen, to be valued as a member of our church family. Those who might be going through a difficult time and just need to be around people who genuinely care, people who understand their difficulties and are willing to share in their burden. We are here so they will not lose heart, so they will not lose hope. And that's what the Apostle Paul was talking about in 2 Corinthians 4 when he said: "Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. So, we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen. For what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal. (16-18) Our ultimate hope when we are experiencing illness, persecution, loneliness, despair, rejection, or pain of any kind is the realization that this life is not all there is.



We can make:


Cakes, Cookies, Cupcakes, Giant Cupcakes and Jumbo Cupcakes. We can also make:

And then there is this:
