Our Faith is a Verb

By this time next week, the presidential election will hopefully be over although there is a fear that the outcome may or may not be contested, to be litigated in the courts. What is particularly troubling is the fact that our Christian faith has been weaponized to the point it has gotten extremely ugly and partisan. Now that's not to say that religious affiliation or beliefs haven't been a factor in past elections for public office. It has but not to the extent we are seeing it play out now. It's as if the debate over who might be the better Christian and therefore better suited to lead the nation, is on steroids.

Now, before you get alarmed by the prospect that I'm going to preach politics from the pulpit, I am not. Where I am going ing it. with this is that recently I was watching a televised town hall meeting where a candidate was asked whether or he or she prayed. His or her response was yes, they prayed, and that their faith was a verb. anyone else caught it. The candidate didn't identify as to which denomination he or she was, just that their faith was an action word and not merely a label. I was disappointed that the moderator didn't dig deeper so the candidate could explain what it means to put one's faith into action. I later learned that the candidate was not a Methodist so I knew his or her response, if there was to be one, would not have been in the Wesleyan tradition but certainly would have referenced what the Apostle James wrote in his

letter regarding faith without action being dead. (James 2: 14-26)

I remember when I got the word that I was going to be appointed to Community United Methodist Church and how excited and scared I was. Assuming a leadership role in a church, especially as a pastor, can be intimidating. I had not been to seminary so I didn't have that religious training ordained pastors have and can fall back on. God knew that so one day when I was wandering around the used book section at our local Goodwill, I was perusing the religion section when I spotted a recent edition of The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church. It caught my attention so I looked it over and then gave my pastor a call to see if it was something I should buy and read. I was advised to buy it, so I did and took it home to begin read-

As an attorney, I was amazed at how detail oriented the Methodists were. It appeared they had a statement or position on That caught my attention, and I wondered if just about all things religious. I wondered if anyone else knew about this book. In the section on Our Doctrinal Heritage, I found a statement on Faith and Good Works that said: We see God's grace and human activity working together in the relationship of faith and good works. God's grace calls forth human response and discipline. Faith is the only response essential for salvation. However, the General Rules remind us that salvation evidences itself in good works. For Wesley, even repentance should be accompanied by "fruits meet for repentance," or works of piety and mercy. Both faith and


good works belong within an all-encompassing theology of grace, since they stem from God's gracious love "shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Spirit." It was saying that our good works was evidence of our salvation. Our good works spoke for us. It was the fruit of our repentance. Why did I not know this?

And right under that was a position entitled: Mission and Service that stated: We insist that personal salvation always involves Christian mission and service to the world. By joining heart and hand, we assert that personal religion, evangelical witness, and Christian social action are reciprocal and mutually reinforcing. Scriptural holiness entails more than personal piety; love of God is always linked with love of neighbor, a passion for justice and renewal in the life of the world. The General Rules represent one traditional expression of the intrinsic relationship between Christian life and thought as understood within the Wesleyan tradition. Theology is the servant of piety, which in turn is the ground of social conscience and the impetus for social action and global interaction, always in the empowering context of the reign of God. This is a call to action.

For Wesley there is no religion but social religion, no holiness but social holiness. As Methodists, our communal forms of faith in the Wesleyan tradition not only promote personal growth, they also equip and mobilize us for mission and service to the world. Our faith is a verb.

The challenge for us in the years to come is to make sure our faith is deep and strong so that when we jump into action others will recognize our good works as evidence of our faith, and that they too might want to know what it is that we have that makes us so self-assured and confident in our daily walk. We can't do this alone. We need each other. We need you. We need you worshipping with us, supporting our church with your prayers, your talents, and your tithes so that we can continue to be an active presence in our community who have come to know us as action figures, the somebodies who do something in Jesus' name.






